Every two seconds someone in the Central Maryland, Northern Virginia, Washington DC, or Southern Pennsylvania area receives blood. Over 1300 units of blood are needed daily to meet the demand. Approximately 95% of the population will need blood during their lifetime. A single shock trauma victim can use 100 units of blood in a few hours. A single liver transplant operation can require a minimum of 50 units. Giving blood is giving the gift of life. The next blood drive is Monday, December 10th at the Elks Lodge on Truckhouse Road, just south of Earleigh Heights Road. When you see the sign-up list, please respond. Someone will be really glad you did.

On September 12th and 13th Severn River Lions Dick Bloomquist, Rollins Clark, Roger Knauth, Bob Muchow, Dale Strait, and Ollie Wittig screened some 300 children in our two "adopted" schools, Barclay and

Waverly elementary/middle schools in the Homewood area of Baltimore. They used the Titmus Vision Screener to screen for refractive error defects. The screening identified those children who were among the 140 children from the six Greater Homewood elementary/middle schools taken to the LensCrafters Vision van on September 20 and 21 to be examined by eye doctors and fitted with free eye glasses. This is the third year that LASH has coordinated refractive error and preschool vision screening in the six elementary/middle schools in the Greater Homewood area. This is a very economically distressed area of the inner city with few local resources but a strong community partner support program developed by the Vista (Volunteers In Service To America) program of AmeriCorps. LASH is one of these community partners, coordinating the efforts of a handful of District 22A Lions clubs and Baltimore area LensCrafters stores and Vision Van to provide hundreds of free eye exams and eyeglasses to the Homewood area school children. Our club has been a key player in this partnership from the beginning and has been instrumental in providing preschool vision screening for the presence of vision defects that lead to amblyopia commonly called "lazy eye," the leading cause of monocular blindness in people under the age of 70. Over 40 preschoolers with "lazy eye" have been found and treated the past two years. This is the first year that the SRLC also participated in the refractive error screening portion of Refractive error screening was the vision screening program. accelerated this year because of the early arrival in the school year of the Vision Van. Preschool vision screening will begin in the Homewood schools in October. Please join in this great project that changes children's lives for the better

Sight Savers: Preventing Vision Loss from Diabetes

When was the last time you noticed how wonderful it is to enjoy the simplest of life's pleasures – like reading books and watching TV? We're so busy with the "big things," the little things often go unnoticed. Unless you're like a retired schoolteacher and patient of doctor Anastasios Fokas, O.D. Dr. Fokas' patient had been recently diagnosed with diabetes. Troubling enough, for sure. But, no one told her that a common effect of the disease is a specific eye condition. And it's no little thing at all. In fact, diabetic retinopathy now affects 5 million Americans and causes 20,000 new cases of blindness each year.

For Dr. Fokas' patient, the timing of her eye exam couldn't have been better. She went in thinking it was just an ordinary exam to get new glasses. But, the 67-year old retiree got a lot more – the gift of vision saved. That's because Dr. Fokas noticed that the newly diagnosed diabetic already had signs of retinopathy – in the form of weakened blood vessels that were leaking various fluids into the retinas of her eyes.

That leaking impairs vision, and if left unchecked, ultimately causes blindness. Dr. Fokas was relieved his patient came in when she did. Although some damage had already been done, he caught the condition in time to do something about it. He referred her to a specialist, who used a state-of-the-art laser technique to correct the leaking vessels. The patient also got a new prescription for new medications to help her condition. Now, with her sight protected and diabetes closely monitored, Dr. Fokas' patient has a whole new outlook on the "little things." Says the doctor: "Each time I see her, she tells me how wonderful it is to still be able to read books and watch television at night!"

Thanks to several new treatments, people with diabetes can do more to protect their health – from their eye health or elsewhere in their bodies. While the eye treatments have complex medical names, they are helping more people preserve and enjoy the seemingly simple gift of sight.

Some cutting edge tactics against retinopathy

- Laser photocoagulation: These laser treatments can help seal off leaky retinal blood vessels and stop new ones from forming.
- Vitrectomy: A surgical technique that removes blood between the lens and retina, often restoring lost vision.
- Intraocular steroids: Sounds scary, but these are injected right into the eye, and they reduce swelling and inflamed tissue for many patients.

Saving sight: Dr. Fokas's view

Anastasios Fokas is among a nation of doctors worried about diabetes – now considered a "national epidemic." "I see patients all the time who aren't managing their disease well, and that's just tragic," says Dr. Fokas. "Their vision could have been saved, if only they'd managed their illness better." Managing diabetes well means a number of things. There's weight management, exercise and controlling blood sugar. And, it means an eye exam – every year, so your doctor can catch any signs of diabetic retinopathy in time to help.

Dale announced that a SureSight vision screening device and a Titmus screening tool had been ordered as approved by the SRLC Foundation.

Old Business/Reports:

Membership: Roger Knauth reported on the recent meeting of the Membership committee. A draft copy of the committee report detailing the four year membership plan was presented for discussion. Member comments for revisions and additions included:

- *add a statement that emphasizes retention of current members
- *increase participation of Affiliate and MAL members
- *publicize club progress at each meeting
- *focus on "family type" activities to attract younger members
- *increase PR effort in the community to publicize club activities
- *stress building Active members rather than number of members
- *get all club members involved in club activities

Gary's Garden Mart Fall Fest: Nancy Burns reported that the festival will be held two weekends, September 29 and 30 and October 6 and 7. Sign up sheets for the different tasks for this mega event have been circulated and membership participation is needed to insure success. Rick Stefany and Dick Maurer will coordinate set up and purchasing for the event.

September 16 General Membership meeting: DG Dick Bloomquist will make an official visit.

October 16 meeting: Paula Yutzy will be the presenter of a Diabetes Awareness Program. Other clubs in the Region have been invited to attend this session.

Fruit Sale 2007-2008: Randy Roberts reported that the fruit sale dates have been set: November 11, December 15, January 19, February 23, and March 22 and the use of the lot at Severna Park HS has been confirmed. Flyers will be distributed in the Severna Park *Voice* in November and the SP Chamber of Commerce newsletter. Essex Middle River Chase Lions Club: A gift for the new Lions club that is chartering was discussed. A cash gift of one-hundred dollars (\$100.00) from the Activities account was approved by the Board.


Homewood Vision Screening: Dale Strait reported that acuity screenings are set for Barclay School and Waverly School in the Homewood area for September 12 and 13.
